Activities Director

The ERA School Board approved Mr. Kristofer Babler as Eagle Ridge Academy's first full-time Activities Director. Mr. Babler has experience coaching at both the high school and college level. He has a BA from Gustavus Adolphus College in English Literature and a MS in Applied Kinesiology and Sports Management from the University of Minnesota. On March 20, the ERA School Board approved Dr. Bruce Locklear as the principal of Schools of Logic and Rhetoric. Dr. Locklear most recently served as Principal for Edina High School from 2007 until his retirement in 2017. While there, he led the school in being recognized as a Newsweek Top performing high school for numerous years, as well as developed a School within a School program to serve at-risk students (of which 100% of participants graduated!). Dr. Locklear was recognized as the Minnesota Secondary Principal of the Year in 2010. Prior to his time with Edina, he served in many other roles detailed in the community letter.

MCA Testing Updates

Testing will begin on Tues., April 17

After spring break, students in grades 3-8, 10, and 11 will be taking the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs). See the testing schedule here:



Importance of Testing

Starting this year, students who do not take the MCAs will negatively impact a school's MCA proficiency by counting as not passing the assessment. There are several repercussions for the school and the student when a student does not test.

The score does not provide a clear picture of an individual student's performance. When students do not take the MCAs, the not passing score creates an inaccurate picture of school performance, which could negatively impact our charter renewal as well as school-wide and teacher goals linked to performance.

As a result of these changes, it is imperative that students take the assessment during the testing window from 4/17 to 5/3.



SPOTLIGHT ON [DIGITAL] CITIZENSHIP

What does it mean to be a good digital citizen?

Individuals who practice good citizenship are respectful, honest, empathetic, selfless, problem-solvers, proactive, and are critical skeptics. They assume positive intentions, express kindness, and practice integrity of self and others. These qualities also stand true in the digital environment, if not more so because there is no longer a face behind the screen name. Digital citizenship is a journey that we are all embarking on and navigating together. Thus, it is essential that we take charge of teaching our children what it means to be not just good citizens, but also how to be good digital citizens.

What does my student need to know?

Grammar: It's never too early to start talking with your child about what it means to be a good digital citizen. <u>Common Sense Media</u> recommends beginning to communicate with younger children about safety online, privacy rules, and showing respect for others.

Logic: In the middle grades, families should discuss the quality of sources, the impact of posting online, and the importance of standing up for yourself and others when someone is mean or something doesn't seem right. Middle school is also when many students begin using social media, and it is essential to discuss the difference between an online friend and a friend your child knows personally.

Rhetoric: During the upper grades, begin talking with children about how their actions online can have a more significant impact on others. Often an individual's digital footprint can also impact their future employment and college opportunities since anyone can search them online, and often do.

How can I help my student become a good digital citizen?

Model best practice for your child! One of the best ways for children to learn is through someone else modeling what a good digital citizen is. Create a list of qualities you want your child to possess when using their device, correlate actions to those qualities, and then model those actions on a daily basis for your child.

Dialogue with your child is a great way to start talking about what it means to be a good digital citizen. Ask them what they think it means and how to embody it. Talk about what they are doing on devices, especially the content. Often students will play games like Roblox or Minecraft, which are heavily filtered. However, then students will watch videos on Youtube for how to better play the game which may include more explicit language or content, so ask what they are watching with general interest.

Also, take the time to play with them. Have them teach you something using a new game or technology.

Finally, do your research. Common Sense Media is an excellent resource for parents and educators to learn how to talk to students about media and read reviews on the latest apps, games, TV shows, movies, and even books!
