Why are you interested in serving on the Board of Directors?

What personal qualities, experience, and expertise would you bring to the Board?

What issues need to be addressed by the Board of Directors in the next few years?

As the Schools of Logic and Rhetoric continue to grow, the Board will need to take into account the physical space we have available and find a way to balance that with the increased need for teachers and teaching spaces without overloading teachers with overly large class sizes. They will also need to continue to consider ways to increase student retention at the high school level and ways to support staff and students at all levels in their pursuit of Classical learning and tradition.

How would you evaluate if Eagle Ridge Academy is delivering its intended mission?

I think that we would need to break the mission down into measurable criteria for success, and then the most important factor would be to look at our students, both current and graduated. I would want to be able to see our current students engaging in their learning with a good attitude and desire to learn. I would want to see that they understand our mission and vision and are inspired to follow the tenets of truth, beauty, and goodness in class and at home.

I would also want to see that our alumni are walking out of our school after graduation feeling prepared to go into life as hard working, active, and informed citizens.



How would you weigh the input from parents, students, teachers, and the Administration in making Board decisions?

I think that Board decisions are a balancing act that need to be able to maintain the integrity of the mission and vision of our Classical school while simultaneously being able to thoughtfully consider the input of all those in our community who may be impacted by those decisions. What issues need to be addressed by the Board of Directors in the next few years?

This can be done in many ways, through supporting initiatives, working with administration, and further building trust and relationships with the school community. While doing this, the Board also needs to work to maintain its current status as a high quality charter school, where all students feel safe, welcomed, and able to flourish. One of the greatest strengths of the Board of Directors is that we consistently put student learning at the forefront of decision making. I will continue to work to help the Board stay focused on this moving into the future.

How would you evaluate if Eagle Ridge Academy is delivering its intended mission?

We asked the school community (parents, teachers, staff, and students) many questions regarding not only the mission but also about the Academy as a whole. Overall, these results were very positive. If I continue to serve on the Board, I will encourage the school to continue to use these measures to evaluate the Academy on its goals and mission as a school.



How would you weigh the input from parents, students, teachers, and the Administration in making Board decisions?

One of the steepest learning curves for new Board members is the need to learn this skill. It can be overwhelming to receive, often conflicting, input from different stakeholder groups. While serving as Board Chair for the past two years, I have learned a lot about the importance of input and feedback from the community. First and foremost, I have learned to listen. If people are taking the time to contact me, their concern is genuine and they deserve to be heard. I always seek to understand. Once I feel like I understand the perspective of various stakeholder groups, I can then move forward to making the best decision I am able to make. I always center myself back to the students, student learning, and the best way to allow them to be successful while living out our mission and vision. By having a strong foundation and understanding of the "why", it makes it easier to weigh community input in the decision making process.

In your own words, describe the mission and vision of Eagle Ridge Academy.

Eagle Ridge Academy is a Classical Liberal Arts school that helps students develop into well-rounded citizens of the world through a strong curriculum presented by highly trained educators who share a passion for the development of life-long learners. Education at Eagle Ridge Academy is about more than just memorizing facts to be able to perform work. A great education is rooted in virtue and the creation of wonder and awe. Students at Eagle Ridge Academy are encouraged to be thinkers and learners for life, helping them each reach their highest potential both now and in the future.



David Croson– Parent

Why are you interested in serving on the Board of Directors?

As a sitting Parent representative and the Treasurer for ERA, I am seeking reelection for the 2023-2025 term. I remain committed to the principles of a Classical education and want to help ERA realize its potential, not only as an excellent primary and middle school, but as an outstanding high school to graduate from – regardless of students' future life plans.

The past two years have been characterized by emergency pandemic-related decisions – some explicitly health-related, others money-related, still others learning-related. I ran for the Board thinking I would be promoting initiatives encouraging ERA's most ambitious students to excel. The reality was much more prosaic: avoiding catastrophe while keeping students learning in person; setting school calendars that respected family priorities; mediating tensions over collegiality and inclusiveness; and creating a long-overdue strategic plan for the Academy in the face of many challenges.

Every Board member must balance their own situation (and that of their peers) with the best interests of the Academy as a whole. As the proud parent of two Gryphons (class of 2025 and 2027), I am running on the belief that what's good for ERA is good for its students and graduates as well. I will advocate (at the strategic level, supported by administration) for initiatives such as more College in the Schools and PSEO, organized PSAT preparation for 10th and 11th-graders, community involvement (both ERA-focused and ERA-driven), enriching after-school activities, and support for unconventional but praiseworthy actions that show ERA's distinctive dedication to truth, beauty, and goodness.

What personal qualities, experience, and expertise would you bring to the Board?

I'm an educator who believes in excellence through perseverance. Building on my foundational classical education, I graduated from a top public high school (in Maryland) and earned two degrees from Penn State and a Ph.D. from Harvard, subsequently working as a professor at multiple universities including University of Minnesota. My education yielded a broad choice of career options and I want ERA students to have these options, too.

I currently serve as ERA Board Treasurer and work closely with BergenKV, our financial service partner, to ensure that ERA's money is spent responsibly. With experience in consulting, business management, strategy, and entrepreneurship, I analyze everything, as my fellow Board members can attest. In my first Board term, I started several new financial initiatives, ranging from the sensible management of temporary extra funds to long-term planning for scholarships that encourage the development of new Classical educators. I take the Board's responsibility of paying attention to the big-picture items seriously; saving 1% on a \$100,000 expenditure frees up \$1,000 to be invested in concrete initiatives and activities that promote ERA's learning environment. If every teacher came up with a \$1,000 initiative that would really advance learning and enthusiasm in their classroom, I would fight to find that money (and would figure out a cost-effective way to grant as many wishes as possible.) My contributions to ERA's financial management extend the Academy's capabilities and I hope to continue to do so by being re-elected.

What aspects of Eagle Ridge Academy do you think are the most important to maintain?

To benefit the most from a Classical education, one must really want it. We must continue to find students who want what ERA offers, show them who we are, and persuade them that we're the school for them. On the other hand, students who don't want to commit to the ERA ethos (pillars), whether they're enrolled at ERA or not, would be better served by another school.



We must remember that the Classical education that ERA offers was, until very recently, reserved for only the children of the wealthy and privileged (and, mostly, only for the boys!) We are engaged in two radical education enterprises: first, to make such education available to everyone who wants it, free of charge; and second, to demonstrate the proposition that this education (judiciously supplemented with new topics such as psychology, computer programming, robotics, and modern history) continues to be universally relevant in the 21st century.

I believe that ERA must maintain its pursuit of excellence from all students and to make this pursuit not simply a slogan, but an active guide towards creating policies for civil behavior and creating a safe learning environment – which needs gentle disciplinary procedures when the policies are brushed up against, but firm ones in the rare cases where they are purposefully and repeatedly trampled. A great starting place would be to ensure an environment of mutual respect between teachers and students. We are, perhaps, 90% there but the last 10% of the race will be the toughest.

What issues need to be addressed by the Board of Directors in the next few years?

The Board must ensure that ERA be recognized as excellent, which requires not only achieving excellence but demonstrating it to the community. We must clearly highlight our identity to students and parents who believe as we do: that participation and well-roundedness is more important than specialization; that strong writing is more important than standardized test scores; that learning is more important than GPA; that logic and rhetoric are more important than football, and that inclusiveness and civility is more important than who wins any one debate.

Having excelled at Grammar and Logic, ERA must devote more time and resources to the School of Rhetoric (SoR). Frankly, the SoR is not yet delivering its full potential, nor do traditional measures fully recognize the amazing, deep educational components that it does deliver. Our waitlist in the Schools of Grammar and Logic puts relentless pressure on ERA to expand, rather than improve -- but we must invest in the SoR to plan for the coming surge of 9th-graders, who we hope will choose to stay at ERA rather than take their Classical foundations to other, highly competitive, regional high schools where they will, no doubt, also excel. Before we expand, we must bolster our foundation or face losing our best. The next two years will be pivotal in getting the School of Rhetoric recognized for what it does, as well as expanding its excellence. Only then can we consider expansion of our mission to significantly more students.

How would you evaluate if Eagle Ridge Academy is delivering its intended mission?

Currently, ERA evaluates achieving its mission based on relatively dry, quantitative data that does not capture its uniqueness. For our graduates seeking higher education, the complex soft skills of critical reading, logical and civil argument, and broad familiarity with humankind's achievements (completely unmeasured by most standardized tests, not to mention abandoned by most high schools) distinguish them powerfully from typical high-school graduates and prepare them for even higher accomplishments in college and beyond. Building these skills requires active involvement of students in their own learning and enthusiastic classroom participation, at all grade levels. ERA is not a place to sit quietly and repeat answers on dull weekly quizzes; it is a place of discovery, of debate, and of making small, instructive mistakes to grow wise slowly.

Graduates entering the workforce, joining the military, or simply entering civic life will be prepared to lead (or advise leaders) and we should be proud of them for excelling in their chosen fields, whether or not they ever again conjugate an irregular verb, solve a system of equations, write a five-paragraph essay, perform music, or thoughtfully read a novel. Our greatest measure of achievement will be our graduates' attitude towards their education; a justified amount of school pride; a desire to recommend ERA to their friends, community members, and a desire to give back by volunteering, tutoring, donating, mentoring, or even returning as teachers through the Grow Your Own program.



How would you weigh the input from parents, students, teachers, and the Administration in making Board decisions?

Parents, students, and teachers are all part of the ERA community and their input is not only welcome, it is essential. I would encourage parents, and teachers to bring big issues to the Board and I promise to listen to them, ask questions, and decide based on the greater good of the Academy as a whole.

Board decisions, however, must focus on big-picture strategic ideas. More operational ideas are reserved (and rightly so) for administration. It should not be the Board that decides on operational issues, however sensible or debatable -- whether, for example, leggings as well as tights should be permitted on formal-dress days or whether an Advanced Placement sequence in another language might be substituted for Latin III (both of which I'd argue in favor of as a parent, by the way, but which are inappropriate to consider as a Board member).

I would similarly encourage parents, students, and teachers to bring important but non-strategic issues to the attention of the administration (preferably after having talked with peers about them and offering a prospective solution, rather than simply noting a problem.) I serve on the Board because I believe that active, engaged parents are an enormous asset to a thriving Academy; please be active, engaged parents alongside me and bring your strengths to the table (whether as volunteers, donors, encouraging academic excellence at home, or other partnerships of your choice) in making ERA a better place.

In your own words, describe the mission and vision of Eagle Ridge Academy.

Over the past two years, the Board have wrestled with the specific wording of the mission and vision in the new strategic plan, trying to keep the spirit of the words while refreshing them for ERA's 20th anniversary. Rather than paraphrase, I will deliberately emphasize the optimistic nature of this spirit. I think we are a community unified by our beliefs that these goals (exemplified in our Mission and Vision) are important and, further, believe that we ought to take advantage of the mutuality of our goals become a stronger one.

The mission of Eagle Ridge Academy is to make available, to every student who wants it and is willing to actively participate in it, an education based on the rich history of human thought; scientific, literary and artistic achievements; and the constant hope for a brighter future.

The vision is that such a thinking-centered curriculum, guided by experienced Classical professional teachers, rivals the best education available anywhere in the world now, or, indeed, at any point in the world's history. Embracing such a learning journey through buying into the Pillars (Citizenship, Integrity, Perseverance, Honor, E and Respect)) shows all students the glory of their own capabilities, worth and potential, as well as how to overcome adversity; demonstrates that inclusion and cooperation yield much better results than and division; and shows that freedom of thought, of expression, and of self-determination lead to long-term prosperity, satisfaction, and ambition to make a difference in their adult lives.
